


ROSEDALE Celebrating 150 years!





In 1922, the citizens of Rosedale advocated for the building of the Rosedale Arch, a scaled down version of the Arc de Triomphe in France, to honor the 177th Rainbow Brigade who fought in WWI. The arch was completed in 1924, and since became a memorial for Rosedalian veterans from WWII.



CELEBRATING ADVOCACY

In 2022, the Rainbow Summer Program (RSP) scholars, equipped with the guidebook Make Change Happen: Middle School Edition, A Youth Guide to Advocacy in Rosedale, took proactive steps in their neighborhood. Among these bright stars was Sahiry Mera-Hernandez. She penned a heartfelt letter to the Mayor Tyrone Garner, expressing concern for neighbors enduring wintertime without proper clothing.

With community spirit, Sahiry, alongside RDA and the mayor's office, orchestrated a coat drive. Together, they collected coats, hats, and gloves, ensuring that 25 struggling families in Rosedale could stay warm throughout the winter months. The RSP students are poised for another coat drive this winter, spreading warmth and kindness to the community once again.

Rainbow Summer Program serves scholars between grades K-8. Throughout the summer, students learn about gardening basics, financial literacy, basics for various sports, nutrition and more. They also engage in summer reading and learn problem-solving skills that will prepare them for the future.

CELEBRATING VOLUNTEERS

For the past 11 years during the MLK day of service in January, our dedicated volunteer readers held RISE, Reading Inspirational Stories to Empower. Last year we introduced our new fall RISE event for the 9/11 day of service, commemorating the first responders, community helpers, and victims from that tragic day on September 11, 2001. Volunteers choose books and discussion topics around finding heroes and helpers in every community and introducing students how everyday citizens can make an impact. Students engaged in advocacy activities afterwards, as our major goal of the event is to empower students to use their voices and stand up for a cause they believe in.


Rosedalians have been showing up, diving in, and helping each other for 150 years. Twenty twenty-two was no different. Volunteers helped with Rosedale projects large and small including neighborhood cleanups and graffiti removal, Rozarks trail workdays, Christmas in October, programs such as Rainbow Summer Program and the youth soccer club, garden and orchard maintenance, and event support for Haunted Halloween and the Luminary Hike.

Volunteers plant trees and maintain trails during a Rozarks trail workday.







Businesses flourished along Southwest Blvd. at the beginning of the 20th century.





CELEBRATING DEVELOPMENT


The vision of the Rosedale Master Plan was to create a vibrant, diverse, and walkable neighborhood with metrowide access that provides a delightful and safe place to live, work, shop, and play. Rosedalians set the direction for the community in 2016 through surveys, meetings, and focus groups. The Master Plan continues to guide how neighborhoods grow and develop over time.

In 2022, one housing proposal was The Hudson, a 228-apartment complex emerging at the bustling intersection of 36th and Rainbow. It aligned strongly with the Rosedale Master Plan. But not all proposals fit with the needs of the neighborhoods, and residents assembled to champion for and against a controversial housing project at 46th and Rainbow. Many Rosedalians used the Couch to Commission Advocacy guide or a training on understanding and applying the Master Plan to prepare their comments to the commission.






The Hudson will be a 228-unit marketrate apartment community with first-class amenities at the corner of 36th St. and Rainbow Blvd., immediately adjacent to the world-renowned KU Medical Center campus. Construction began in 2023.


CELEBRATING DETERMINATION


Tackling a major project like this one takes a whole community – the brainpower, skills, passion and relationships that already exist in Rosedale. That's why in 2022, residents and businesses joined RDA to form the Rosedale Community Center Stakeholders. They conducted extensive research and tours of existing community centers, seeking the ideal location. Community Housing of Wyandotte County (CHWC), partnering with RDA, explored various locations and made site recommendations. Fulfilling this dream is going to take a lot more work, and fundraising is the next step.
